Intercollegiate Division History

The National Wheelchair Basketball Association (NWBA) was founded in 1949. For the first twenty-one years of the NWBA, the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign was the only university in the United States to provide an intercollegiate wheelchair basketball program. During the late 1960's and early 1970's, then University of Illinois wheelchair basketball coach Stan Labanowich and NWBA Commissioner and founder, Tim Nugent worked with other universities with the goal of establishing formal wheelchair sports competition for students with disabilities.

Their efforts helped create additional programs at Southern Illinois University, Southwest State University, the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater and Wright State University. The first intercollegiate wheelchair basketball game was played on December 3, 1970 between Southwest State University and the University of Illinois.

In April 1977, the first National Intercollegiate Wheelchair Basketball Tournament (NIWBT) was won by Southern Illinois, University. It was during the meetings held at this tournament that Frank Brasile, who was the coach at the University of Illinois, made a motion to form an intercollegiate conference within the structure of the National Wheelchair Basketball Association. Brasile wanted to assure that these intercollegiate teams became recognized for what they were (truly intercollegiate athletic teams) and to assure that the team members were also treated like théir student-athlete peers when it came to peers and recognition's of intercollegiate athletes. It was the intention of this conference to meet the legislative mandates for individuals with disabilities to be treated equally under the guise of Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act the following year, the Central Intercollegiate Conference was formed. The mission of the conference was simply to address the unique needs, interests, and abilities of the student-athlete while maintaining active membership in the NWBA.

Intercollegiate Division History

In 2003, the Central Intercollegiate Conference became the Intercollegiate Division. This gave intercollegiate teams more autonomy within the NWBA. Since the inception of the Intercollegiate Division, the following teams have been members of the divisions at one time or another: The University of Illinois, Southwest Minnesota State University, the University of Wisconsin- Whitewater, Wright State University, Southern Illinois University, Temple University, the University of Texas Arlington, the University of Arizona, Edinboro University, Oklahoma State University, Auburn University, the University of Alabama, the University of Nebraska Omaha, City University of New York, Eastern Washington University, and the University of Missouri.

The first women's collegiate team was formed at the University of Illinois in 1970. In 1974, Bob Szyman, then the Director of Recreation and Athletics at Illinois, organized the first women's wheelchair basketball game played between two college-based teams, the University of Illinois Ms. Kids and the Southern Illinois University Squidettes, in Kenney Gym on the Illinois campus. As the only women's collegiate team, the University of Illinois competed in the men's collegiate division through the early 2000's.

In the mid 2000's, programs grew at the University of Alabama, the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater, Edinboro University, and the University of Texas-Arlington. Out of this growth came a necessity to form a women's college division within the Intercollegiate Division. The 2010-11 season marked the inaugural season for women's competition at the collegiate level.

PLAYING THE GAME

RULES AND DEFINITIONS

PLAYERS

Any person who has a permanent lower limb impairment and cannot play stand-up basketball is eligible for wheelchair basketball. Not everyone who plays wheelchair basketball uses a wheelchair every day.

WHEELCHAIRS

The wheelchair is considered part of the body. Every player sets up their wheelchair based on their physical size and functional ability (see classification). Higher class players have the most function and sit taller with a flat seat. Lower class players have less function and sit with dump (the back of the wheelchair is lower than the front) to maximize their balance. All players use straps to be one with the wheelchair (just as stand-up players tie their shoes), have one or two wheels in the back, and slanted wheels (chamber) to allow them to spin faster and be more stable.

TIME LIMITS

An offensive player cannot remain more than three seconds in the key while the player's team is in possession of the ball. The three second count begins when the ball is over half court and ends if a player is working to get out of the key. On offense, a team must get the ball over half court in eight seconds or it is a turnover.

DRIBBLING

Stand-up basketball has a two step travel rule; wheelchair basketball has a two push travel rule. If a player pushes more than twice in succession with one or both hands in either direction without dribbling the ball, it is a travel. A player may, however, wheel the wheelchair and bounce the ball simultaneously just as an able-bodied player runs and bounces the ball in stand-up basketball.

FALLING

If a player falls and is in immediate danger (such as in the key or near the ball), the play will be stopped. If a player falls and is not in danger, play will continue. If a player falls onto another player to gain possession of the ball, it is a foul.

FAQ:

WHY DO WHEELCHAIR BASKETBALL PLAYERS SEEM TO KEEP CRASHING INTO EACH OTHER?

When 10 players in wheelchairs are moving rapidly in a limited area contact will occur. Some of the contact is incidental and does not lead to an advantage. This type of contact is overlooked by the officials. Other types of contact give a player an advantage and are fouls. These include charging and blocking like in stand-up basketball. Unique to wheelchair basketball are fouls for holding and backing in.

WHAT ABOUT WHEELCHAIRS AND THE LINES?

For a successful three-point field goal or free throw, the large wheels of the wheelchair must be behind the three-point line or free throw line, but the front casters may be over the line. A player is out of bounds when any part of their body or wheelchair touches the line. To inbound the ball, all wheels must be behind the line.

HOW DOES WHEELCHAIR BASKETBALL COMPARE TO STAND-UP BASKETBALL?

Wheelchair basketball and stand-up basketball are very similar in rules, except that there is no double dribble rule in wheelchair basketball (players can stop and start dribbling as often as they want). While the strategies are different, wheelchair basketball players set picks, seals and screens. They run fast breaks and shoot three-pointers. The court size, basket height, ball size, free throw and three-point lines are the same. Women's games are four 10-minute quarters. There is a 24-second shot clock.

CLASSIFICATION



SPORT CLASS 1.0

Players in sport class 1.0 have no trunk control and thus cannot bend forward or sideways or rotate to catch and pass the ball. To keep a stable position, the backrest of the wheelchair is a bit higher and the athletes usually have a strap for their trunk.

SPORT CLASS 2.0

These players can lean forward and rotate their body to some extent, allowing them to catch the ball within a larger radius. Like their team members in sport class 1.0, their wheelchairs have a higher backrest and strapping for trunk support.





SPORT CLASS 3.0

These players can lean forward and rotate their body allowing them to catch the ball within a larger radius. Their wheelchairs have a lower backrest and strapping for pelvis support.

SPORT CLASS 4.0

While 4.0 players can move forward and rotate like their team members in sport class 3.0, they can partially lean to the sides as well. Often players in this sport class can lean to one side only, for example, because an impairment in one leg would cause loss of balance to the other side.





SPORT CLASS 4.5

Players in this sport class have the least impairment and no restriction in trunk rotation or leaning forward or sideways. Players with an amputation or a 6 cm leg length difference would be eligible.

An athlete can also be allocated the sport class 1.5, 2.5, or 3.5. The activity profile of these "half-pointers" fit in between the profiles of the lower and higher classes.
